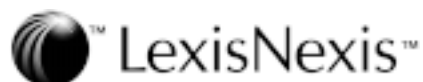

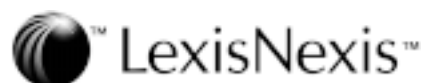

# SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

This edition of *Papers of the NAACP* consists of the Field Staff files of the NAACP's Branch Department. The Branch Department field staff included some of the association's most outstanding leaders, and their correspondence and reports provide a detailed view of NAACP initiatives on a regional, state, and local level. During the period covered by this edition, the NAACP faced new challenges in the form of an upstart Black Power movement, riots in urban areas, and renewed white resistance to civil rights gains. This series of Branch Department files, however, reveals that the NAACP branch network continued to work vigorously for the association's long-standing goal of ending racial discrimination in all aspects of American life.

Between 1946 and 1976, the Branch Department was led by Gloster B. Current. Current established the regional office network, beginning in the late 1940s, in order to provide a full-time professional staff to link the local branches with the NAACP's national headquarters in New York. Current required his field staff to submit detailed monthly and annual reports summarizing their activities; the status of NAACP initiatives in school desegregation, employment, housing, political action, legal defense, memberships, and fund-raising; and any other major developments in their areas. The reports of the field staff reveal an extremely active NAACP branch network, not only in southern states, but throughout the nation.

By 1965, eleven years had passed since the NAACP's landmark victory in *Brown v. Board of Education*, in which the Supreme Court ruled that "separate but equal" educational facilities were unconstitutional. Just a year after the original *Brown* ruling, however, in a decision known as *Brown II* (1955), the court declared that school desegregation should proceed "with all deliberate speed." This vague formulation by the court enabled local southern school authorities to postpone indefinitely any meaningful school desegregation. The passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, however, marked another decisive moment in the civil rights struggle and in the school desegregation battle. Title VI of the act stated that programs receiving federal assistance had to operate on a nondiscriminatory basis and the Health, Education, and Welfare Department (HEW) was authorized to devise nondiscriminatory funding regulations. Since public school systems throughout the country availed themselves of federal funding, the NAACP could sue in federal court in hopes of forcing the federal government to withhold funding from schools that failed to comply with the HEW regulations.

The Field Staff files in this edition contain regular reports on NAACP efforts between 1965 and 1972 to achieve school desegregation and quality education for

African Americans. For example, the reports of Georgia field secretaries Amos O. Holmes and Robert B. Flanagan frequently mentioned the progress of school desegregation in their state. In his 1967 annual report, Holmes wrote that thirty-one school systems in Georgia were not in compliance with HEW guidelines, but that pressure being brought by NAACP branches was leading to changes in some districts. The files of Southeast Regional Director Ruby Hurley also contain regular summaries of school desegregation efforts in southern states.

By the early 1970s, the issue of busing to achieve school desegregation is discussed in Hurley's reports. In a telegram to President Richard Nixon, reproduced in Hurley's 1972 annual report, she wrote that the NAACP supported busing "as one of the means to achieve unitary school systems" and to prepare children for their lives in a racially diverse nation (Reel 17, Frame 0455). Additional material pertaining to school desegregation as well as busing can be found in the files of Southwest Regional Director Richard L. Dockery, West Coast Regional Director Leonard H. Carter, and West Coast legislative advocate and Field Secretary Virna M. Canson. These materials and other reports in this edition reveal that the NAACP's campaign for school desegregation and quality education continued to be a top priority for the association between 1965 and 1972.

Local NAACP efforts to expand employment opportunities for African Americans are also covered in detail in the Field Staff files. The files of Ohio Field Director Harold C. Strickland contain materials on employment in the construction industry and membership in building trades unions. For example, there is a January 1966 letter from Bruce H. Green, president of the Cincinnati, Ohio, NAACP branch, to Donald Slaiman, director of the AFL-CIO's Department of Civil Rights, in which Green criticizes the exclusionary practices of the building trades. Green also tells Slaiman that the NAACP and AFL-CIO could work together for the benefit of both of their constituencies. A June 1967 report by Strickland discusses the important case of *Ethridge v. Rhodes*. In this case, U.S. District Court Judge Joseph Kinneary ruled that the state of Ohio could not enter into contracts with four companies for the construction of a medical science building at Ohio State University because these companies permitted discriminatory hiring practices. Other Field Staff files contain reports on other important employment battles. The files of West Coast Regional Director Leonard H. Carter contain many items pertaining to NAACP efforts to expand public sector employment for African Americans and Mexican Americans in California. There is also a report by Responsible Corporate Action, a coalition of many civil rights groups, including the NAACP, entitled "Corporate Apartheid—California, U.S.A. Style." The report chronicles the exclusion of African Americans, Mexican Americans, and women from corporate executive and managerial positions. Other employment episodes covered in the Field Staff files include strikes by agricultural workers in Delano, California; by sanitation workers in Decatur, Georgia; and by hospital workers in Charleston, South Carolina.

NAACP political involvement between 1965 and 1972 involved four main areas: voter registration, political campaigns by members, lobbying for civil rights

legislation, and involvement with the War on Poverty. The passage of the Voting Rights Act of 1965 had a significant impact on African American participation in the political arena. The act prohibited the use of tests or other qualifications to deny the right to vote. It also provided for the deployment of federal registrars to monitor voter registration in areas where less than 50 percent of the minority residents of voting age were registered. The NAACP took advantage of this legislation by launching voter registration efforts throughout the nation. Field staff regularly mentioned voter registration gains in their monthly and yearly reports. This progress, in turn, led to greater electoral success of African American candidates and there are frequent reports of electoral victories, particularly on the local level. For example, Ohio Field Director Harold C. Strickland's files have newspaper clippings pertaining to Carl Stokes's tenure as mayor of Cleveland, Ohio. Stokes was an NAACP member and the first African American to be elected mayor of a major American city when he won Cleveland's mayoral post in 1967. The files of Mississippi Field Secretary Charles Evers contain a draft report on Evers's own 1969 inauguration as mayor of Fayette, Mississippi.

The one major civil rights issue not covered by the Civil Rights Act of 1964 was housing. As a result, in the period after 1964, the NAACP remained very active on the state and local level in pressing for expanded and improved housing opportunities for African Americans. An example of this activity can be found in Ruby Hurley's 1966 annual report for the southeast region. Quoting the Florida field director, Hurley reported on housing efforts in Tampa, Jacksonville, Fort Lauderdale, Stuart, Gainesville, Clearwater, Pompano Beach, Miami, and St. Petersburg. This same annual report also briefly mentioned NAACP housing initiatives in Georgia, North Carolina, and Tennessee. The files of Region IV Regional Director Julius E. Williams cover housing controversies in Missouri. There is a copy of instructions for an open housing march by the Springfield NAACP branch and a letter by Williams to NAACP Director of Branches Gloster B. Current endorsing the protest. Williams's monthly report for April to June 1966 discusses housing opportunities in Kansas City and an urban renewal project in Independence. Appended to this monthly report are a copy of Kansas City's open housing ordinance and the materials collected by Williams in his investigation of the urban renewal project.

California was the location of one of the most important state housing controversies in which the NAACP became involved. A 1964 referendum, Proposition 13, invalidated two pieces of California fair housing legislation—the Unruh Civil Rights Act of 1959 and the Rumsford Fair Housing Act of 1963. In May 1966, however, the California Supreme Court declared Proposition 13 unconstitutional. The files of Virna M. Canson, Charles E. Mays, and Leonard H. Carter have materials documenting how the housing issue played out after 1966. For example, Canson's March 1968 Legislative Advocate's Report mentions the introduction of three new housing bills into the California legislature. Canson's files also include newspaper clippings pertaining to California's housing legislation. Additional materials on housing in this period can be found in UPA's *Papers of the*

*NAACP, Part 28: Special Subject Files, 1966–1970.* Earlier NAACP campaigns against housing discrimination can be found in *Papers of the NAACP, Part 5: The Campaign Against Residential Segregation, 1914–1955*, and *Papers of the NAACP, Supplement to Part 5, Residential Segregation, General Office Files, 1956–1965*.

In addition to battling for its traditional goals between 1965 and 1972, the association also faced new challenges in this period. Two challenges that are documented in this edition are the emergence of the Black Power movement and riots in urban areas. There are several items pertaining to the development of a Black Power contingent within the NAACP. These included the Young Turks and the National Association for the Advancement of Black People's Caucus. There are also materials on two national Black Power organizations: the Black Panther Party and the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC); and on two local Black Power groups, Operation Black Unity in Cleveland, Ohio, and Black United Youth in Little Rock, Arkansas. Another major issue confronting the NAACP in the period after 1965 was the outbreak of urban riots. Beginning with riots in Harlem, Rochester, and Philadelphia in 1964 and the Watts riots of 1965, hundreds of riots followed nationwide beginning in 1966. This edition contains reports on several of these riots, including those in Atlanta, Georgia; Augusta, Georgia; Bakersfield, California; Cairo, Illinois; Columbus, Ohio; Kansas City, Missouri; Omaha, Nebraska; and Orangeburg, South Carolina. Additional documentation on the NAACP's response to the Black Power movement and urban riots can be found in *Papers of the NAACP, Supplement to Part 1, 1966–1970; Supplement to Part 16, 1966–1970; and Part 28: Special Subject Files, 1966–1970*.

These Field Staff files are arranged into two series. The first series contains correspondence and reports from state field secretaries and directors. These files are arranged alphabetically by state, and thereunder by the name of the field staff member. Some of the files in this series also contain the records of area and regional field staff. These files are organized by the state in which the staff member's office was located. For example, Virna M. Canson was the West Coast field director and legislative advocate. Her office was located in Sacramento, California, and therefore her files can be found in this series under California. The second series contains the reports and correspondence of Branch Department regional directors. Regions represented in this edition are Region I (West Coast), Region III (Midwest), Region IV (Midwest), Region V (Southeast), and Region VI (Southwest).

This edition of *Papers of the NAACP* represents the first set of Branch Department files microfilmed by UPA of the post-1965 portion of the NAACP Records collection. Branch Department Field Staff files for this period can also be found in *Papers of the NAACP, Part 29: Branch Department, Series C: Branch Newsletters and Regional Field Office Files, 1966–1971*, and *Series D: Branch Department General Subject Files, 1966–1970*. Branch Department Field Staff files for the period from 1940 to 1965 can be found in *Papers of the NAACP, Part 25: Branch Department Files*, and in *Part 17: National Staff Files*. Files from NAACP branch offices and state conferences can be found in Parts 12, 26, and 27 of *Papers*

*of the NAACP*. Taken together, these parts of *Papers of the NAACP* provide a substantial amount of documentation on the activities of NAACP field staff and on the functioning of the Branch Department, local NAACP branches, and state conferences.

## SOURCE NOTE

All documents microfilmed for this edition are held by the Manuscript Division of the Library of Congress, Washington, D.C. The files selected for this edition were drawn exclusively from Group VI (1884–1992), Series C (Branch Department Files) of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) Records collection.

## EDITORIAL NOTE

Professors John H. Bracey, Jr., and Sharon Harley compiled this edition of *Papers of the NAACP* after a thorough survey of all the Branch Department Field Staff files in Group VI of the NAACP Records collection at the Library of Congress. Due to the provision in the collection's deed of gift restricting access to materials dated within the last thirty years without written permission of the NAACP, files with materials dated after 1972 have been omitted from this edition. Those files can be consulted on site at the Library of Congress, however, with the written permission of the NAACP. Each file selected for this edition has been reproduced in its entirety.
