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# INTRODUCTION

The creation of history as a scholarly discipline has always depended on the discovery, preservation, and accessibility of primary sources. Some of the leading figures in the first generation of academic historians in the United States spent much of their time and energy on this endeavor and in so doing made possible the work of their colleagues who wrote monographs and general histories. The inventions of microfilm and photocopying vastly improved access to such sources.

At any given time the prevailing conceptions of what is significant in the past will determine which sources are sought and valued. When politics and diplomacy are the center of historians' concern, government documents, treaties, newspapers, and correspondence of political leaders and diplomats will be collected and made accessible. When intellectual history is ascendant, the works of philosophers and reflective thinkers will be studied, analyzed, and discussed. Economic historians will look for records of trade, evidence of price fluctuations, conditions of labor, and other kinds of data originally collected for business purposes. The propensity of modern governments to collect statistics has made possible whole new fields for historical analysis.

In our own time social historians have flourished, and for them evidence of how people of all kinds have lived, felt, thought, and behaved is a central concern. Private diaries and personal letters are valued for the light they throw on what French historians label the *mentalité* of a particular time and place. The fact that such documents were usually created only for the writer, or for a friend or relative, gives them an immediacy not often found in other kinds of records. At best the writers tell us—directly or by implication—what they think and feel and do. Even the language and the allusions in such spontaneous expression are useful to the historian, whose inferences might surprise the writer could she know what was being made of her words.

This microfilm series focuses on a particular group (women) in a particular place (the South) in a particular time (the nineteenth century). The fact that many of these documents exist is a tribute to the work of several generations of staff members at the leading archives of the South such as the Southern Historical Collection at Chapel Hill, North Carolina; the William R. Perkins Library at Duke University; the Alderman Library at the University of Virginia; the South Caroliniana Library; the Louisiana and Lower Mississippi Valley Collections, Louisiana State University; the Swem Library at the College of William and Mary, Colonial Williamsburg; and several state historical societies. The legend of Southern Historical Collection founder J. G. DeRoulhac Hamilton who, in his effort to preserve the evidence of the southern past, traveled about in his Model A Ford knocking on doors, asking people to look in their attics and cellars for material, is well known. The result of his labors and those of his counterparts and successors is a vast collection that includes thousands of letters from women of all ages and hundreds of diaries or diary fragments. Only a small part of this material has been studied by professional historians. Some family collections cover decades, even several generations. Others are fragmentary: diaries begun in moments of enthusiasm and shortly abandoned; letters sporadically saved.

The years of the Civil War are particularly well documented, since many women were convinced that they were living through momentous historical events of which they should make a record. After the war ended and the "new South" began to take shape, other women wrote memoirs for their children and grandchildren, hoping to preserve forever their memories of a better

time "before the war" or to record the sacrifices and heroism they had witnessed. The United Daughters of the Confederacy made a special effort to persuade women to record their wartime memories. In the best of circumstances—and each collection included in this edition was chosen precisely with this consideration in mind—the collections preserve the voices of one or more women through letters or diaries that cover many years.

Although women's letters to soldiers were often lost in the mud and carnage of battlefields, soldiers' letters were treasured and have survived in abundance. If it is true, as Virginia Woolf once wrote, that in writing a letter one tries to reflect something of the recipient, then these letters, too, may add to our understanding of the lives of women and families. Moreover so many of the soldiers' letters respond to women's questions, give hints or instructions on managing property, and allude to family life and routine at home, that they can be used to draw valid inferences about the activities of their female correspondents, even when the woman's side of the correspondence is altogether lost.

Seen through women's eyes, nineteenth-century southern social history takes on new dimensions. Subjects that were of only passing interest when historians depended on documents created by men now move to center stage. Women's letters dwell heavily on illness, pregnancy, and childbirth. From them we can learn what it is like to live in a society in which very few diseases are well understood, in which death is common in all age groups, and in which infant mortality is an accepted fact of life. A woman of forty-three, writing in 1851, observed that her father, mother, four sisters, three brothers, and two infants were all dead, and except for her father, none had reached the age of thirty-six.<sup>2</sup>

Slavery has been a central concern of southern historians, generally from the white male perspective. Seen through the eyes of plantation mistresses, the peculiar institution becomes even more complex. We can observe a few women searching their souls about the morality of the institution, and many more complaining bitterly about the practical burdens it places upon them. We can find mothers worrying about the temptations slave life offers to husbands and sons—and even occasionally expressing sympathy for the vulnerability of slave women. Some claim to be opposed to the institution but do not take any steps to free their own slaves. Others simply agonize. There is, unfortunately, no countervailing written record to enable us to see the relationship from the slaves' point of view.

Until late in the century the word feminism did not exist, and in the South "women's rights" were often identified with the hated antislavery movement. "Strong-minded woman" was a term of anathema. Even so we find antebellum southern women in their most private moments wondering why men's lives are so much less burdened than their own and why it is always they who must, as one woman wrote, provide the ladder on which a man may climb to heaven. Very early in the nineteenth century women's letters sometimes dwelt on the puzzling questions having to do with women's proper role. After the Civil War a Georgia diarist reflected, apropos the battle over black suffrage, that if anyone, even the Yankees, had given her the right to vote she would not readily give it up.<sup>3</sup> As early as the 1860s a handful of southern women presented suffrage arguments to the state constitutional conventions. After 1865 a surprising number of women spoke out in favor of suffrage and a larger number were quiet supporters. There were, of course, equally ardent opponents, and until 1910 or so, organizing suffrage associations was uphill work. As one goes through these records, however, suffragists and advocates of women's rights emerge from the dim corners in which they tended to conceal themselves when they were alive.

The conventional view that southern women eschewed politics will not survive a close reading of these records. In 1808 one letter writer regretted the fact that a male literary society would have no more parties since she enjoyed listening to the men talk politics.<sup>4</sup> As early as the 1820s there is evidence for women's participation in political meetings and discussions. Such involvement continued through the secession debates and the difficult days of reconstruction. A South Carolina memoir offers a stirring account of the role of women in the critical election of 1876.<sup>5</sup> By the 1870s southern women were already using their church societies to carve out a political role, and by the end of the century they had added secular clubs, many of them focused on civic improvement.

Reading women's documents we can envision the kinds of education available to the most favored among them. Many women kept records of their reading and much of it was demanding: Plutarch's *Lives*, for example, or Gibbon's *Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire*. A very young woman who recorded reading Humboldt's *Kosmos*, Milton's *Paradise Lost*, Madame De Stael's *Corinne*, and Guizot's *History of Civilization* was not altogether unique. Others castigated themselves for reading novels and resolved (sometimes over and over) to undertake more serious study. At the very beginning of the nineteenth century a young woman from southwest Virginia had gone to Williamsburg to school, presumably to a female academy or seminary.<sup>6</sup> There are many examples of strenuous efforts at self-education, and in the privacy of their diaries some women admitted to a passionate longing for knowledge (reading clubs, for example, were described as "a peace offering to a hungry mind").<sup>7</sup> Of course one of the limitations of sources such as these is precisely that they come principally from the minority who had some education. It is up to the perceptive historian to extrapolate from these documents to the poorer women, the slave women, and all those who seldom left a record at all. (There are occasional letters from slaves in these voluminous collections, but they are rare.)

Papers that cover a considerable period provide us with many real-life dramas. Courtship patterns and marriage and family experience emerge. We see the widow left with children to support as she tries various options to earn a living—and in some cases takes to drink to ease her burdens. We see the single woman cast on her own resources as she tries teaching or housekeeping for a widower to keep body and soul together. Single sisters of wives who died young were likely to wind up first taking care of the bereft children and then marrying the widower. Other single women bemoan their fate and reflect that it might be better to be dead than to live single. The Majette Family Papers from the holdings of the Virginia Historical Society provide one good example among many in the series where a husband and wife corresponded as he moved a slave force into new western lands (in Arkansas) while she managed an established plantation in the old southeast.<sup>8</sup> Married or single, rich or poor, many women inadvertently reveal the socialization that has persuaded them that they should never complain, that they must be the burden bearers of family life.

Through the whole century, while the rest of the country was restlessly urbanizing, the South remained predominantly an agricultural society. Women's records allow us to see the boredom of rural life in which almost any bit of news, any adolescent wickedness, any youthful romance is subject for comment. We see also the profound religious faith that supported many women through poverty, childbirth, widowhood, and the other trials that filled their lives. The religious history of

the Civil War emerges as we see faith challenged by defeat, and many women beginning to question things they had always believed. In an act of stoical determination, the mortally ill Ann (Randolph) Fitzhugh penned a comprehensive essay of advice to her pre-teen daughters bequeathing them her ethics on the importance of religion in personal deportment, on the choosing of husbands, and even on sexual relations.<sup>9</sup>

No reader of these documents can any longer doubt that plantation women, in addition to supervising the work of slaves, worked very hard themselves. Depending on their level of affluence, women might take care of livestock and chickens, plant and harvest gardens, card, spin and weave, make quilts, sew clothes, and perform many other specific tasks. The Soldiers' Aid Societies that formed so quickly after secession rested on just these skills developed in the previous years.

One of the most interesting aspects of southern culture that emerges from papers such as these is the views women and men had of each other. No matter how much a woman admired any particular man, she often viewed men in general with extreme skepticism and sometimes with outright bitterness. Men were often described as selfish, authoritarian, profligate, given to drinking too much, and likely to judge women as a class, not in terms of their individual attributes. Many women found their economic dependence galling. In spite of the rather general chafing at the confines of patriarchy, individual women were devoted to and greatly admired their own husbands, sons, and fathers. Women who traveled spoke with admiration of the independence exhibited by northern women (this both before and after the Civil War). Discontent with their own lot included a good deal of private railing against constant childbearing and the burdens of caring for numerous children.

The concept of a woman's culture is borne out by much of what can be read here. Women frequently assume that they say and feel things that only other women can understand.

It would be difficult to exaggerate the significance of this microfilm publication. Historians of women have been making use of many of these collections for decades. It is becoming clear that they are useful to the student of almost any aspect of southern culture and society. In an example, Clarence Mohr, writing about slavery in Georgia, realized that women's records were virtually his only source for testing the well-established southern myth that all slaves had been docile, helpful workers when men went to war and left their wives and children to supervise plantations. Years earlier Bell Irwin Wiley had suggested that the story was more complicated than that, but it did not occur to him to look for evidence in women's papers. The description of such docility never seemed reasonable, but it was believed by many people, even some who had every reason to know better. In a close examination of women's diaries and letters, Mohr found a quite different picture, one of slaves who, when the master departed, became willful and hard to direct and who gave the mistress many causes for distress. To be sure, they did not often murder families in their beds, but they became lackadaisical about work, took off without permission, talked back, and ran away to the Yankees when opportunity presented itself. They made use of all the thousand and one ways of expressing the frustration bondsmen and women must always feel.<sup>10</sup>

Wartime documents are revealing in other ways. We can see rumors flying, as victories and defeats were created in the mind, not on the battlefield. We sense the tension of waiting for word from men in the army. We see the women gradually losing faith that God will protect them from the invaders. For some, religion itself is called in question by the experience of invasion and defeat.

As we move into the remaining decades of the nineteenth century, these records allow us to trace some of the dramatic social changes of the postwar world. In one family we see a member of the generation of post–Civil War single women earning her living in a variety of ways and then beginning a

full-time career as a teacher at the age of fifty-eight. She continued to teach well into her eighth decade. This particular set of papers is especially valuable since it goes through three generations—a wonderful exposition of social change as revealed in the lives of women.<sup>11</sup>

We must be struck by the number of men in the immediate postwar years who chose suicide over the challenges of creating a new society without slaves. In records from the second half of the century we can see lynching from the white perspective, observe the universal experience of adolescence, watch the arrival of rural free delivery of mail and the coming of the telephone, and many other evidences of change. Reading these personal documents the historian may be reminded of Tolstoy's dictum that all happy families are alike, while unhappy families are each unhappy in their own way. One may be tempted to revise the aphorism to say that every family is sometimes happy and sometimes unhappy—the balance between the two states makes for a satisfactory or unsatisfactory life. Reading family papers one may also be forcefully reminded of Martha Washington, writing about the difficulties she faced as first lady. She was, she said, "determined to be cheerful and to be happy, in whatever situation I may be; for I have also learned from experience that the greater part of our happiness or misery depends upon our dispositions, and not upon our circumstances."

From the larger perspective of the social historian, records such as these will help us develop a more comprehensive picture of life as it was experienced by the literate part of the southern population over a century. They help us understand the intricate interaction of individual lives and social change. We can see the world through eyes that perceive very differently from our own and understand better the dramatic shifts in values that have occurred in the twentieth century. Like any other historical data these must be used with care, with empathy, with detachment, and with humility. But given those conditions they will add significantly to our understanding of a world that in one sense is dead and gone, and in another sense lives on in the hearts and minds and behavior patterns of many southern people.

# SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

This microfilm publication consists of fifty-six manuscript collections filmed from the holdings of the University of Virginia Library. These records focus on the experiences of women and their families living in Virginia between 1810 and 1918, though the documents date back to 1700 and extend to 1983. The histories of several founding Virginia families are represented, including the families of politician John W. Daniel, law professors John B. Minor and John A. G. Davis, and author Judith Page Walker Rives, and the many branches of the Martha Jefferson Randolph family, among others. The papers include letters, journal entries, financial ledgers and receipts, scrapbooks, wills and legal documents, short stories and novels, biographical manuscripts, genealogical records, and report cards.

Although there are many famous figures in this collection, the central character is the University of Virginia, founded by Thomas Jefferson in 1825. When the university opened its doors it became the center of the social and academic community in Virginia, and nearly every correspondent in the collections has a connection with the school. Few could compete with the involvement of the Randolph family, however, as Martha Jefferson Randolph was her father's primary caretaker during his establishment of the university. In letters to her daughter, Ellen Wayles Randolph Coolidge, she wrote often of her concern for her father's health due to his heavy involvement with university affairs, and in lighter moments she passed along campus gossip, including news of a riot that led to the expulsion of several students. Jefferson's vision of the school as a self-governing society led to frequent expressions of lawlessness that ended in 1840 when beloved law professor John A. G. Davis was shot and killed by a masked student. Afterward a student honor code was enforced and the campus became quieter. Although the University of Virginia did not become fully coeducational until 1970, it was never a completely male space. The professors of this collection (including Davis, John B. Minor, Paul B. Barringer, and Thomas L. Preston) lived with their families on campus or nearby, and their wives and daughters frequently corresponded on the school happenings.

The collections are unusually interwoven because of the lynchpin effect of the University of Virginia, bringing the families into close geographic proximity and social circle. The families frequently intermarried and mingled, and many names in the Subject Index appear as correspondents outside of their family collection. Martha Davis's marriage to John B. Minor brought the Minor and Davis families together, and the Saunders and Davis families cemented their bond when Davis siblings married Saunders siblings. The Pages married into the Walkers, who married into the Rives family. Even when no connection between families is clear from the family tree, the middle names of children often indicate unexpected relationships and alliances. The result is a remarkably complete view of the community, with each collection offering insight into shared experiences, from the Civil War to deaths in the family.

In addition to bringing families together, marriage gave everyone something to talk about. The documents capture the courtships of many couples throughout the nineteenth century. The marriage between James L. Hubard and Isaetta Carter Randolph in 1860 is particularly well-documented, as is the four-year courtship between Susan Colston Minor and John Wilson in the 1890s. In addition to lovers talking between themselves, relationships often invited the commen-

tary of others. Sallie Carter Randolph wrote of her son Robert's failed relationship in 1877: "When we meet I expect I shall talk myself sick—so much we cannot say or discuss by letter. Robert's suit is at an end, as I thought it would terminate [...] As Uncle Isaac used to say so few women are honest in such affairs. I always distrusted her after the first break off. She is a stranger to us all and none need speak of her at all. I think it is always best to do so." (Reel 21, Frame 0828.) Ellen Bankhead Carter's correspondence with Septimia Randolph Meikleham in the 1830s reveals not so much about her new husband but a fair amount about her views on marriage: "Of all the embarrassing parts of getting married, dear Tim, I think coming among your husband's relation[s], a perfect stranger, is the [illegible], but I was received so cordially, and affectionately, that I could not long feel the awkwardness of the situation." (Reel 24, Frame 0166.) The male perspective on courtship might be provided, among others, by the politician Shelton F. Leake in a series of letters in 1843 seeking advice on relationships from John B. Minor: "I in love, ha! And where was I Thursday? Wo. Do. Do. On Friday, Saturday, and Sunday? And for whom do I dress most particularly? I could, if I would, but I won't, answer your interrogations with a single monosyllable." (Reel 27, Frame 0926.)

The Civil War is a landmark event in nearly every collection. Most women had husbands, brothers, or sons fighting for the Confederacy, and their correspondence provides a vivid glimpse of life on the home front. Several men, including Eugene Davis and James L. Hubard, were taken prisoner by the Union Army, sending their families scrambling to locate them and then to send supplies to ensure they were well-cared for. The war also prompted an increased interest in slavery, though in most families slaves had long been a regular news topic. The Randolph family often reported the activities of their slaves, especially Burwell and Sally Hemings, as they would write of any other mutual acquaintance. After the war the residents of Virginia continued their interest in African Americans. Paul B. Barringer studied the African American criminal element, and Mary Willis Minor wrote a fascinating essay concerning her relationship with an institutionalized African American girl named Liddy and Minor's efforts to improve her situation.

The Civil War, African Americans, marriage, and the University of Virginia are only a few of the topics addressed by the correspondents in this publication. Other topics include children and childbirth, education, diseases, genealogy, literature, and Reconstruction. Descriptions of each collection, and a list of major topics, can be found in the Reel Index of this user guide. An alphabetical list of major topics and prominent persons can be found in the Subject Index. Related collections on women in Virginia include Southern Women and Their Families in the 19th Century: Papers and Diaries, Series A, Part 4: The Nicholas Philip Trist Papers; Series A, Part 6: Virginia; and Series D, Holdings of the Virginia Historical Society, Parts 1–3. Other collections filmed from the University of Virginia Library include Records of Ante-Bellum Southern Plantations from the Revolution through the Civil War: Series E, Parts 1–6.

The collections microfilmed in this edition are holdings of the Special Collections Department, University of Virginia Library, P.O. Box 400110, University of Virginia, Charlottesville, Virginia 22904-4110. The descriptions of the collections provided in this user guide are adapted from inventories and indexes compiled by the Special Collections Department. The inventories and indexes are included among the introductory materials appearing on the microfilm at the beginning of each collection. Historical maps, microfilmed among the introductory materials, are courtesy of the Map Collection of the Academic Affairs Library of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Maps consulted include Thomas G. Bradford, *Comprehensive Atlas*, 1835.

# **EDITORIAL NOTE**

The collections selected for this edition have been chosen under criteria established by series Consulting Editor Anne Firor Scott. In some instances, materials in the collections have been omitted from filming as follows: genealogy and photocopies from the Barringer Family Papers; documents other than correspondence from the John Warwick Daniel Papers; oversized items from the Douglass Family Papers; materials relating to persons other than Mrs. J. H. Fultz from Miscellaneous Virginia Papers; business papers, accounts, daybooks, and ledgers from the Johnston-Wright Family Papers; law school papers from the Minor-Wilson Family Papers; legal records, Yellowstone Expedition journal, diaries, and photos from the Thomas Lafayette Rosser Papers; and documents dating after 1918 from the Susan Colston Wilson Papers. Omissions have been noted on the film.

#### Baker Family Papers, 1781–1921 Gordonsville, Orange County, Virginia

The Baker family papers contain business and estate papers of Martin Baker Sr. and Martin Baker Jr. in addition to genealogy documents for the Baker, Swift, and Omohundro families. At the center of the collection are the letters of Lucinda Baker Ellett describing her abusive marriage and begging for her brother Martin's help. Ellett was making efforts to remove her children, who were also targets of abuse, from the household, and to secure legal protection from her husband. Despite describing beatings with a gig whip, being kicked as she lay in bed, and a choking incident, Ellett's letters suggest her brother did not support her leaving the marriage.

#### Barringer Family Papers, 1828–1963 Albemarle County, Virginia

The collection centers around the papers of Paul Brandon Barringer (PBB), professor of medicine at the University of Virginia and president of Virginia Polytechnic Institute (V.P.I.). Documents relating to the schools compose the bulk of the collection, including papers on a scandal at V.P.I. concerning Barringer's personal behavior, the sale of hogs infected with cholera, and the presence of a prostitute on campus. Barringer corresponded on many topics including his invention of a fire extinguisher, genealogy, and racial issues. In 1911 he sent out a questionnaire to law enforcement posing questions such as "Do you see any signs of a coming Negro type which, like the Malay, arms himself, loads up on dope, and goes out to kill or be killed?" The collection also includes material on Rufus Barringer's imprisonment at Fort Delaware during the Civil War, life at boarding schools in the 1870s, and slavery.

#### Coolidge-Randolph Collection, ca. 1810–1861 Albemarle County, Virginia

The collection focuses on the correspondence of Ellen Wayles Randolph, granddaughter of Thomas Jefferson and daughter of Martha Jefferson Randolph and Thomas Mann Randolph. Beginning in 1814 Ellen Randolph's letters to her mother and others describe her early life on the social circuit, eying Martin Van Buren as a candidate for romance (were he not "encumbered with five children") and meeting up with many of her grandfather's friends, particularly the Madisons and Marquis de Lafayette. She married Joseph Coolidge in 1825 and eventually moved near his family in Boston, Massachusetts. Thomas Jefferson's health is a constant theme, receiving frequent reports of rheumatism, swelling in his legs, and dosages of laudanum. The family's financial straits are an increasing concern. In early 1826 Congress made provisions for Jefferson to remain at Monticello for his lifetime, but this was no great comfort to Martha Jefferson Randolph. Her father had only a few months to live and her husband, Thomas Mann Randolph, was deeply in debt and progressively estranged from his family. A frantic letter from Nicholas Trist on July 4, 1826, urges the Coolidges to come to Monticello at once, not knowing Jefferson would die later that day. The Randolphs were in even worse shape after his death and pinned their hopes on the sale of lottery tickets to keep them afloat. Family members disagreed on the best course of action. Jefferson Randolph proposed abandoning Monticello and felt the family lived well beyond its means. Ellen Coolidge seemed most concerned with identifying what went wrong with her grandfather's fortunes, writing of the many factors in correspondence and an 1826 essay. Her letters after 1826 mostly concern her pregnancies, including the birth of twins in 1830, and the social scene in Boston. Her struggle to find good nurses and maids in the North sparks frequent comparisons between slaves and free servants. Although she wrote of her discomfort with slavery while living in Virginia, Coolidge seemed to grow nostalgic for the institution once removed from it. The slaves at Monticello were mentioned often, particularly Burwell and Sally Hemings. The rumored relationship between Thomas Jefferson and Sally Hemings is not mentioned until long after Sally's death. In 1858 Ellen Coolidge wrote specifically about the allegations and stated that all four of Sally's children were fathered by Peter Carr, describing a confession by Carr to that effect.

#### John Warwick Daniel Papers, 1816–1936 Lynchburg, Virginia

After the war he studied law at the University of Virginia and launched a career in state politics. In 1885 Daniel was elected to the U.S. Senate where he served until his death in 1910. ## Hubard-Randolph-Carter Family Papers, ca. 1832–1941 Albemarle County, Virginia

The relationship between James L. Hubard and Isaetta Carter Randolph forms the core subject of the collection. The documents begin with their courtship and provide many details of their wedding in 1860. James L. Hubard promptly left home to serve in the Civil War, as did his brother, William B. Hubard, and Isaetta's brother, Lewis C. Randolph, a field surgeon. Isaetta corresponded with all of the men, and their letters home offer vivid descriptions of life in the camps and among the wounded. In 1864 James L. Hubard was taken as a prisoner of war. Without news from him, Isaetta wrote an anguished letter to her aunt, Ellen Wayles Randolph Coolidge, in Boston to ask if she might know if James were prisoner in the North or if he likely died in battle. In addition, Isaetta describes her parents housing refugees from areas with heavy fighting.

Once returned to his wife, James L. Hubard headed a large family, with eight children by 1874. Having children was not always easy for Isaetta. In the late 1880s she wrote to her mother, Sarah (Sallie) C. Randolph, that she was having her "yearly sorrow" and hoped for a live child this time. Sallie Randolph replied that Isaetta already had eleven children, perhaps suggesting that Isaetta attempt to stop getting pregnant. The large number of children was a financial strain on the family, and Isaetta's mother helped house them while James L. Hubard was working for the family out of town.

Sallie Randolph's other responsibility was to her son Robert, who appears to have had epilepsy or a developmental disorder. Her letters to Isaetta openly recount frequent seizures and violent mood swings. Robert Randolph lived with his mother throughout his life. Other topics include railroads, education, agriculture, and Isaetta's father, Benjamin Franklin Randolph.

More records of the Randolph family can be found throughout this collection: the Coolidge-Randolph papers are on Reels 8 and 9; papers of Septimia Randolph Meikleham are on Reel 24; and the Trist, Burke, and Randolph family collection is on Reels 55 and 56.

Mary Willis Minor gives an account of a young African American girl imprisoned in a small Virginia town. "In June 1887 I was visiting in a town in the mountains of Virginia. My brother who was deeply interested in the welfare of two colored men, who were convicted murderers, told me that there was a little colored girl in the jail, named Liddy, who had defied the whole civil authority of the county and was put in jail for the protection of the community." The narrative follows Minor's successful attempt to transfer Liddy to an asylum for African American children in Washington, D.C. After burying an infant in sand to keep him from crying, Liddy was moved to an asylum for the "feeble minded."

The early collection focuses on the schooling of John B. Minor (1813–1895) at Kenyon College and the University of Virginia; his law partnership with his brother, Lucian Minor; and later his professorship at the University of Virginia. John B. Minor was married first to Martha Davis, then Anne "Nannie" Colston, and finally Ellen T. Hill. The documents shift to the correspondence of John B. Minor's children, and the courtship letters between Susan Colston Minor and John Wilson, and Conway Whittle Sams and Mattie Minor, are especially interesting. Susan Minor carried on a four-year engagement to John Wilson while he established his law practice and made himself suitable in the eyes of Susan's father. Their letters during this long separation are surprisingly frank in emotion: "Dearheart, dearheart, I want you so much—and it is an ever increasing want" she wrote in 1891. Susan, he wrote, was "delicious on paper." Their wedding planning is described in detail. Unfortunately their marital happiness was short-lived as John lived only a few years after their union. Correspondence of their daughter, Susan Colston Wilson, can be found on Reels 57 and 58. Mattie Minor's suitor, historian and women's suffrage opponent Conway Whittle Sams, was even more affectionate, calling Mattie his baby, little one, and wife long before they were married. In one letter Sams made use of his legal training with the following declaration "To All to Whom there Presents may come; Greeting; Be it known unto you that We, C. Whittle, Son of Horace, Bachelor of Law, Attorney at Law and Notary Public for the Great Corporation of the City of Norfolk DO LOVE with all Our Legal and Notarial heart Her Royal Highness Mattie. Daughter of the Great John B., Princess of Albemarle." Their wedding too is the topic of much correspondence, including the names and occupations of all nine of Sams' groomsmen.

John B. Minor's oldest son, John Davis Minor, died at the age of seventeen while a student at the University of Virginia. At the close of the collection there is a detailed eyewitness account of the last days of John Davis Minor, including his religious conversion and the agonizing vigil his father kept.

## Preston-Davis Family Papers, 1840–1900 Albemarle County, Virginia

Several Virginia families come together in this collection. Thomas Lewis Preston (1812–1903), a professor at the University of Virginia, married Elizabeth B. Watts in 1842. Months later, Elizabeth Watts died, but her family remained close to Preston, and many Watts appear as correspondents. Preston then married Anna Maria Saunders, whose siblings, Robert Chancelor Saunders and Louisa Morris Saunders, married siblings Caryetta Davis and Richard T. Davis, children of John A. G. Davis. The papers of their brother, Eugene Davis, can be found on Reel 17. Louisa Saunders Davis wrote frequently to her sister on the topic of her pregnancies and children, sometimes juggling letter writing and caring for them, writing in 1856 "She [Anna Davis] is improving in good looks, but does not fatten. She continues to be a small specimen. [...] (The baby is squealing at the top of her voice for me to go to bed and take her. She has just waked up and is in a very bad humor, I can hardly tell what I am writing with her crying in my hands." Louisa Saunders Davis was frail in health and believed each childbirth to be her last. Between 1857 and 1867, the year she died, Louisa wrote several lengthy letters to her husband and children directing their actions after her death. In 1860 she wrote "I hope no one will ever put a wrong thought into their heads about a step-mother, but that they will be prepared to love and honor her. On your side; I charge you to marry no one who will have an unfavorable influence on my children," which was followed by three pages of lecture on marrying the wrong sort of woman. Louisa's children were not destined for a stepmother, though—by the time of her death she had decided they would go to her sister, Anna Saunders Preston. So in 1867 the childless Prestons became adoptive parents to the surviving Davis children.

During the Civil War Reverend Richard T. Davis kept up frequent correspondence with his wife and family, recording the experiences of the men to whom he ministered and drawing sketches of camp life and battles. Other prominent figures in the collection include Dabney Carr Davis, Lucy Davis, and John B. Minor, who married into the Davis family. Topics include the Episcopal Church, children, and education.

The early documents of the collection are primarily letters of author Judith Page Walker Rives to her young children, Alfred Landon and Amélie, and financial papers of her husband William Cabell Rives. The collection includes several manuscripts by Judith Page Walker Rives, including a handwritten draft of *Home and the World* (1857), which was based on her life as a young married woman in France.

In 1873 tragedy struck the family. Amélie Rives Sigourney was traveling to Europe on the SS *Ville de Havre* with her husband and three of her four children when an English ship, *Lochearn*, collided with the ship. SS *Ville de Havre* sank within twelve minutes, leaving only a handful of survivors. The crash made headlines and the Rives family began receiving cautious words of consolation days before official word came that the entire family had drowned. Harry Sigourney Jr. lost his immediate family overnight and wrote anguished letters to his grandmother, Judith Page Walker Rives, as he struggled to continue his schooling.

## Thomas Lafayette Rosser Papers, 1764–1983 Albemarle County, Virginia

Thomas L. Rosser attended West Point with George Armstrong Custer, who later became his rival in the Shenandoah Valley during the Civil War. Rosser rose up the ranks in the Confederate Army, commanding his regiment in the Second Battle of Bull Run, South Mountain, and Gettysburg. His correspondence includes letters from Robert E. Lee, J. E. B. Stuart, Jubal Early, Judah P. Benjamin, Jefferson Davis, James Dearing, Wade Hampton, and George Wythe Randolph, among others. During the war Rosser married Elizabeth (Betty) Winston, and when the war ended he found it difficult to earn a living locally. Rosser took a job with the Northern Pacific Railroad and was often away from home. His letters to his lonely wife are jovial and full of reassurances that he'll be home soon. In 1870 he wrote "My precious Lizzy. Mad with Tom, hey? Want Tom to make a "splanation"—Liz, Tom pologize—kiss the children and kiss Liz and tell her not to be mad with Old Tom. Really my love you must not be angry with me—I can't go to you and you must come to me. Here I am in a position where I am making money and the job will last at least ten years and in that time I will make my dear dear Lizzy rich." Rosser often dreamed of his family and wrote lengthy narratives of the dreams, even taking actions recommended by them. His letters to his children included cartoons and dreams and emotional descriptions of his fatherly love.

In the twentieth century the collection shifts to the papers of Thomas L. Rosser Jr. and his wife Harriet Gordon Rosser. Harriet's correspondence is full of gossip, speculating on engagements and questionable business ventures. In an 1899 letter to her sister, she mused "I am curious to see the girl who was goose enough to marry Carey [Cary] Ruffin Randolph. Mrs. Rosser wrote she heard she was rich and you say she is sweet looking, so I have come to the conclusion she must be blind and deaf." Meanwhile her husband became an avid genealogist and his correspondence includes many letters to distant cousins recounting the adventures and lineages of Rossers across the country. The collection concludes with the correspondence of their daughter, Barbara.

## Trist, Burke, and Randolph Collection, 1721–1969 Albemarle and Arlington Counties, Virginia; also Louisiana, Mississippi, Pennsylvania, and Cuba

The collection contains miscellaneous correspondence between related members of the Trist, Burke, and Randolph families on a variety of topics including the Civil War, slavery, marriage, and travel. There is a great deal of correspondence between Hore Browse Trist and his cousin, the childless Tryphena Pendarves, who funded the education of Hore Browse Trist Jr. with the intention of making him heir to her husband's property. Also of interest is the fictional "Diary of an Unknown Southern Maiden," which tells a beauty-and-the-beast-like account of being stalked by a deformed overseer's son and eventually kidnapped for the purposes of marriage. In an attempt to escape her tormentor, the heroine dyes her skin brown and lives as the servant of a friend of hers. The papers also contain correspondence of Hore Browse Trist's brother Nicholas P. Trist to his wife, Virginia Randolph Trist, among others.

## Susan Colston Wilson Papers, 1862–1918 Albemarle County, Virginia

Susan Colston Wilson was the daughter of John Wilson and Susan Colston Minor, granddaughter of John B. Minor and Anne "Nannie" Colston Minor. Wilson graduated from the New York School of Fine and Applied Art in 1917, then served in the U.S. Army as a reconstruction aide in France. In 1924 she became the chief occupational therapist at Brooklyn State Hospital, and in 1933 she began undergraduate work at Columbia University and Hunter College. After completing her education Wilson became a lecturer on occupational therapy at New York University and then OT officer at the U.S. Naval Hospital in Seattle. The collection also contains correspondence of Wilson's parents, on topics including their wedding and Susan Minor Wilson's decision to move with her children into the home of her parents at the University of Virginia, following the death of her husband in 1899.
