### **INTRODUCTION**

As Allied forces prepared to mount a massive cross-Channel assault on entrenched German forces, the U.S. Army assigned a small group of men to provide historical accounts of the duties performed by fighting units. The mission of Army historians was to conduct interviews, compile appropriate research materials and create narrative accounts of combat activity for use in official histories. Dr. Forrest C. Pogue, a historian who went to Europe as a Master Sergeant, recalls in the essay that follows this introduction that the task was both daunting and enormously valuable. For virtually the first time, events as they unfolded on the field of battle were recorded soon after the engagement and often in the immediate geographical vicinity of the action through oral history.

### Introduction to the UPA Index and Microfiche Collection

The Combat Interviews and narratives and the related material in this collection provide ground-level reportage of military events in Europe that is uniquely detailed and comprehensive. Despite their obvious importance, these materials have been used only sparingly. Further, this collection has never been reproduced in microform.

Now, for the first time, UPA World War II Combat Interviews index and companion microfiche collection provide researchers the most comprehensive coverage possible to these heretofore difficult-to-access materials. This collection is drawn from the archives of the Military Reference Branch located at the Washington National Records Center in Suitland, Maryland and includes 375 Combat Interviews with related materials on approximately 575 microfiche.

All Index sections are fully described under *User Instruc*tions (see p. xiii).

The microfiche collection contains copies of all materials identified in the Bibliography of Documents and Indexes. The original documents have been reproduced on silver halide film, in negative polarity, at a reduction ratio of 29:1.

The microfiche full texts are numbered and organized to correspond to the organization of listings in the Bibliography. This permits direct access to full texts on microfiche from all references contained in the bibliography and index listings.

### **Organization of the Historical Units**

The Army organized the military historians for OVERLORD against the backdrop of the massive organizational effort required to mount the invasion of France. As Allied forces began preparations, Army Chief of Staff George C. Marshall decided that historians should be dispatched to the field to provide official accounts of combat action. From the outset, the Army wished the historians to have full knowledge of the planned operations. Historians were provided some orientation and training in the U.S., and then were shipped to England to participate in the preinvasion briefings.

### Scope and Content of the Collection

Though the collection is divided into 375 Combat Interviews which focus on particular engagements (see User Instructions—File Organization and Accession Numbers), each Combat Interview, or "CI", includes a variety of documents other than actual interviews. Frequently, information obtained from interviews and from supplementary official materials was drawn together into integrated narrative accounts of specific actions and operations by the military historians. When available, these narratives as well as the supplementary materials including field orders, letters of instruction, periodic and operations reports, statistical data on casualties and strengths, sketch maps and overlays, and even photographs, have been assembled with the interviews to provide a comprehensive record of the action or operation. Field conditions and logistical considerations did not permit the historians to use the bulky and rather crude tape recorders that were available at that time. Thus, they were required to record interviews in long or shorthand and reconstruct the interviews as soon as possible after they had been concluded. Therefore, while interviewees may be quoted extensively, the interviews are not verbatim accounts. Rather, they are summaries—albeit often very detailed—of what was said in the course of the interview.

Historians consistently acquired basic information on the indentity and rank of the interviewee, the unit and the place of engagement. Beyond this basic level, however, the interviews were highly interactive rather than structured. For this reason, interviews tended to be idiosyncratic. Historians followed leads and asked questions as they judged appropriate. Interviewees were asked to annotate maps or draw sketches in the course of the interview to assist in constructing an accurate account of the action, and these materials were collected by the historians and often included in the CI (see Source Documents, below). The process of interviewing combatants was inevitably serendipitous, because historians working under battlefield conditions were not always able to interview all appropriate personnel. Also, few approached the task of writing narrative accounts in the same manner.

Despite inconsistencies in the resulting documentary materials, however, the record which emerged is rich in detail and broad in scope. Many of the Combat Interviews provide virtually complete reconstructions of some of the War's most important and grisly battles. The materials are rich enough in detail to serve as important primary sources for historical research. For example, Charles B. MacDonald consulted the Combat Interviews and associated materials for A Time For Trumpets: The Untold Story of the Battle of the Bulge (New York: Morrow, 1984). Cecil B. Currey, in his Follow Me and Die. The Destruction of An American Division in World War II (New York: Military Heritage Press, 1984), relied very heavily on the interviews and historical accounts compiled during and after the difficult actions involving the 28th Infantry Division in the Hurtgen Forest (near the Siegfried Line).

### **Source Documents**

The Combat Interviews included in this collection are maintained in 112 Hollinger boxes in Record Group 407, Entry 427, Records of the Adjutant General's Office, World War II Operations Reports, 1940-1948. Other Combat Interviews may be scattered in various unit records maintained by the Military Reference Branch. No attempt was made to locate these materials.

It was initially intended to preservation film this collection at the Washington National Records Center operated by the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) in Suitland, Maryland. Unfortunately, onsite filming was delayed and ultimately suspended because NARA officials concluded that filming would result in damage to some of the large maps associated with the collection. After consulting with scholars, it was determined that these excluded maps were not essential to understanding or using the remaining records. Therefore, the best possible photocopies of all available materials, including printed and hand-drawn maps, were obtained and filmed at our microfiche facility.

Quality of the original source documents varies tremendously. Many of the documents were originally produced on translucent paper and with typewriter ribbons that easily smudged; others had deteriorated due to age and through handling associated with research use. Discoloration and poor legibility of the documents were commonplace problems.

### U.S. Army Historical Section Activities in the European Theater, 1944-46

The collection of material on military actions by interviewing combatants within weeks or months or even a number of years after battles has enriched or, when poorly done, distorted history in modern times. In earlier times, as far back as Herodotus or Thucydides, interviewers collected oral testimony to recapture something of the nature of warfare. Years after the American Revolution and the wars of Napoleon, writers took down the tales of ancient survivors. More recently, newspaper reporters filed stories based on interviews and their own observations, and employed artists and cameramen to add vividness and details. The Civil War yielded masses of information and illustration that are still being mined.

In the first World War, the U.S. War Department actually appointed a historian who considered collecting extensive interviews from men after action, but he was never able to work out a satisfactory arrangement. Finally the U.S. Army followed the example of the military authorities who had arranged for a multivolume compilation of documents on the War of the Rebellion. A start was made after World War I on the compilation of directives, after action reports, and the like. Some seventeen volumes were published, but not until after the end of World War II.

For years the American military services had small historical sections that preserved reports of the various branches of the Army and Navy, such as ship logs, records of unit history, battle honors, descriptions of weapons, etc. Units were required to furnish monthly and annual reports that helped in preparing a report of the commanding general (or later, Chief of Staff) of the Army to the Secretary of War. The Army and Navy thus had in being small historical sections with a limited number of civilians and temporarily assigned officers engaged in compiling material.

In 1943, President Franklin D. Roosevelt issued an Executive Order requiring the various departments and special agencies of government to prepare histories of their activities. This action regularized for the Army activities already undertaken in some units after the coming of World War II. Those commanders wishing to collect battle lessons had already appointed some unit historians to interview participants in past actions. After Roosevelt's order, the Army Ground Forces organized a historical program that required a historian for each army and part time historical officials in units down to special battalions. Along with these efforts, the Historical Section of G-2 Division of the Army began making a few special studies on current actions. At the same time the Historical Section engaged in compiling World War I records was still at work. Gradually the G-2 Section began coordinating efforts to collect historical material abroad.

These various historical efforts were strengthened by Army Chief of Staff George C. Marshall's desire to have studies prepared on lessons learned in current campaigns. A little later he asked that a short history or pamphlet be prepared on

specific battles so that men wounded in battle or families of men killed would have a chance to learn the importance of their service to their country. The Historical Section, G-2 Division, became a separate staff section, and it was decided that in order to meet General Marshall's request for a short history written within a relatively short time after a campaign, it would be necessary to have combat historians with units in action to gather details to flesh out official reports. By the beginning of 1944, the Historical Section had selected a small group of combat historians to go from the War Department in Washington to London in time to be briefed on the plans for the Cross-Channel invasion before it was launched. The historians from Washington were to join a few historians from the Historical Office at Headquarters, European Theater of Operations, London.

While units in the Pacific, in the China-Burma-India Theater and in the Mediterranean Theater had improvised historical coverage in the early years of the war, the most extensive effort to collect historical material in World War II was made in Operation OVERLORD in Northwest Europe in 1944-45. It is from this material that the editors of this project have drawn their text.

When the Historical Section of the War Department began briefing the combat historians in mid-March, the actual date for D-Day was still so secret that the historians were told only that an attack was possible after the end of May. Since there was no organized pool of historical officers, a hurried selection was made by asking for recommendations from the current historical offices in Washington. Approximately ten men were assigned temporarily to the Historical Section, War Department, to be sent to London. Four of this group were professional historians, with doctorates in history and college or university teaching experience, two others were doctoral candidates; another was a successful novelist; another a lawyer; and one was a recent Princeton graduate who had edited the university newspaper.

One potential leader of this group was already gathering interviews in the Pacific — Lt. Col. S.L.A. Marshall, military correspondent of the Detroit News. He had served in World War I and had written on early phases of World War II before entering the Army soon after Pearl Harbor. Accompanying assault units on Makin and Kwajalein, Marshall had developed a reputation for conducting mass interviews. Believing in the possibility of reconstructing details of a campaign fought on a small island by a relatively small force, Marshall proposed to substitute for the normal interview (with one to a dozen men) interviews with one or more company-sized formations. The combat historians in Washington were told initially that they should try to use Marshall's techniques as much as possible, but once they were in Europe, they found that Sam Marshall's experience, rank, and reputation as a newspaperman and author on military topics gave him an advantage in his interviewing experiments that none of the other historians was able to achieve. The nature of the campaigns in Europe also made it difficult for anyone, even Marshall, to operate in the same way as he had in the Pacific. He was able to repeat his type of mass interviews only by selecting special units, such as airborne units, that were pulled back to rear areas (sometimes as far back as England) for refitting. For the most part, the interviews in this collection were drawn from a number of fairly small scale interviews held with a few key individuals extending from a division to a section of a platoon.

In mid-March, 1944, Major Hugh M. Cole, who had taught a course in military history at the University of Chicago before being commissioned as an Ordnance officer, was directed to prepare a short, unstructured course for the little group of combat historians. He suggested that they read accounts of earlier campaigns, including an excellent history of Australian troops in World War I. Practical training was made possible by recent arrival in the Pentagon of records and after action reports of U.S. forces engaged in the just completed Buna campaign in New Guinea. The class was required to read the scattered papers and each class member was to write a narrative of one day of the fighting. Very soon the class learned that numerous questions could not be answered by the official reports. The historians began to compile a checklist that would be expanded and rewritten as they conducted interviews overseas.

In the first two weeks of April, the new combat historians were given portable typewriters, map cases, cameras, and revolvers before departing for London in three flights. Because of the low rank of the first nine, the highest rank was major and four were sergeants (one a private first class promoted to sergeant on his overseas orders), the fledgling interviewers had at last to be given VIP status to get them on planes from Washington to London.

During a stay in London of less than three weeks, the historians were attached to Theater Headquarters in Grosvenor Square. Here a small Historical Section under Col. W. A. Ganoe was coordinating historical research of various headquarters that had been established in the United Kingdom. Ganoe, author of a history of the U.S. Army, had been on the staff of the U.S. Military Academy when Dwight D. Eisenhower and Omar N. Bradley were cadets. Both officers welcomed his efforts to gather history of the conflict and promised support to the combat history program.

For the short time in London, the Washington group, now joined by a small London contingent, attended lectures on military organization by a group of officers engaged in invasion planning. The one naval officer present warned that the historians could write their first day's account before the attack by stating, "Confusion reigned on the beaches."

At the end of this orientation, the small contingent was split. About half of the historians were to go to First Army and the remainder to Third Army in the English midlands. The First Army historians went briefly to General Bradley's headquarters in Bristol, where they were joined by Major Jerry O'Sullivan, recently transferred from the historical section of the U.S. Army Air Forces, and several battlefield artists who had been making sketches and drawings (used later in finished works) at airfields, port areas, and training exercises.

After the short stay at First Army Headquarters, the historians left for three corps headquarters to which they were attached for the early phase of operations. Within the space of a few weeks, these men had been transferred from the War

Department to U.S. Theater of Operations, and then to First (or Third) Army. Most of them kept their Army assignments throughout the war, but were attached to one or more corps for specific campaigns.

At this stage a decision was made, at least in the case of First Army, that combat historians would operate mainly from corps headquarters. At that level it was possible to concentrate on those divisional, regimental, and company units that contributed most to a given fight. Later, in some of the other Armies, a combat historian was placed with each division. The result was more complete coverage of each division, but sometimes coverage was skimpy for the most active division.

At three corps headquarters in southern and western England, the combat historians at last could read the plan for the first phase of OVERLORD in detail. The historians had to be specially cleared so they could read BIGOTED material. In addition to the general outlines of the plan for invading Normandy and building up forces for a drive to the Seine and beyond, the historians found detailed descriptions of the invasion area, the locations of beach obstacles and fortifications, estimates of enemy forces, the Allied order of battle, information on sources of information abroad, names of possible French collaborators who might still be working with the Germans, and other pertinent information. The study of the plan went hand in hand with visits of the historians to units that they would interview in Normandy. The purpose was to find men in the various headquarters who kept the daily journals and wrote reports so that these men could be apprised of special information the historians would later request. These preliminaries helped spark a considerable collection of information in each unit that not only aided the combat historians later, but helped swell the final collection of material submitted to the War Department.

About ten days before the invasion, advance elements of corps headquarters and the whole of the first wave of invasion forces moved forward to port areas west of South Hampton, including parts of Cornwall and some areas near the Bristol Channel. The historians were attached to an infantry company so that they could share in the final briefings and actually accompany elements of the follow-up forces to marshalling areas. Here the historians attended briefings, seeing the careful explanations on charts and sandtables of the parts of the coast and the beaches that each company would be assaulting.

Some 25 or 30 men were attached from higher headquarters to the LST carrying the particular company to which fellow historian William J. Fox and I were assigned. Others were liaison officers from Corps on either side of V Corps, observers from the War Department and representatives of special units not assigned to assault phase tasks. Our briefers made clear that since we were unlikely to be of assistance in the initial phases of the attack, we were to go in with follow up forces around mid-day after the beaches were secured.

On Utah Beach, where the landings proceeded rapidly, the historian Lt. Roland G. Ruppenthal and his assistant went in about noon. On Omaha Beach, where V Corps met fierce enemy resistance and the rugged nature of the beach and terrain added delays, the unit to which Fox and I were assigned did not start across the Channel until mid-afternoon. Thus it was late in the evening before our LST arrived near the invasion beach and unloaded its infantry and combat engineers. The attached personnel on board were ordered to wait until the beach area was totally secure before landing. Soon thereafter, according to plan, our LST, specially equipped as

a designated emergency hospital vessel, began to receive men wounded in early action, and the historians were told that as the wounded men did not require major surgery, interviews could begin in a few hours. Thus we were able to claim that on D-Day itself we interviewed participants although we did not actually set foot on Omaha Beach until the morning of D-Day plus 2. For the first week, until jeeps and drivers arrived for the historians, they had to hitch rides with headquarters personnel. In VII Corps, the historian was actually set to work as a member of the corps staff until the First Army Historian and Chief arrived to sort out his assignment.

Before the conclusion of Eisenhower's drive from Normandy to Germany and Czechoslovakia, the U.S. Army had five Information and Historical Sections at the five American armies — First, Third, Seventh, Ninth, and Fifteenth. At the end of the war, some seventy combat historians were engaged in collecting interviews and writing combat narratives. A somewhat smaller number of military personnel (supplemented near and after the end of the war by civilian employees) organized and cataloged after action reports and journals as they were sent in from units in the field. The greater part of the Historical Section in London moved to Paris in September 1944. After a brief stay at the Hotel Majestic, the historians were assigned to the former Austrian Embassy near the Arc de Triomphe. Towards the end of the war in Europe, the group was transferred to a larger building, formerly occupied by the Gestapo, on the Avenue Foch, where it stayed until August 1945, and then moved to the Chateau Hennemont in nearby St. Germain-en-Laye. At the end of the year, after many of the officers and men were returned to the U.S. to be discharged or reassigned, the remaining personnel went to U.S. Forces Headquarters in Frankfurt. Several were hired as civilian historians of the Historical Division, War Department, where they wrote one or more histories of the multivolumed history of World War II.

By July 1944, a lieutenant colonel from the Pentagon had been sent to Normandy to begin writing a volume in the U.S. Forces in Action series that the U.S. Chief of Staff had requested. This volume, Omaha Beach, drew on interviews made in the first weeks of the fighting in Normandy and was expanded by continuing interviews to fill gaps and by official records and reports that were requested from the first units to land. A combat historian was later called from the field to begin work on the St. Lo campaign and the Utah Beach pamphlet was begun shortly afterwards. At the conclusion of the war approximately half the combat historians plus other historians recently recruited began to work on studies of various phases of the five major campaigns in Northwest Europe. Col. S.L.A. Marshall became Theater Historian in the closing days of the war, and under his direction historians worked together in Paris or at St. Germain until the end of 1945.

When the Oral History project of Columbia University began in 1948, the idea of collecting interviews for something called Oral History was termed a new dimension added to historical source material. To the extent that tape recorders were used, these oral historians could claim they had started something new in historical research. But in time, after the founding of the Oral History Association in 1968, most oral historians agreed that the Army's combat history interview program in Northwest Europe, 1944-45, met the major tests established to describe true oral history. For lack of a practical portable tape recorder that could be used in the field, the combat historian employed old and tried methods to collect

detailed or cryptic notes, later to be transcribed by the author for the record. The new Oral Historians granted that earlier historians and newsmen as well as lawyers seeking information for a court action had indeed gathered oral testimony. The oral historians, however, insisted that true oral histories were those collected for a central collection of information to be drawn on by current and future scholars. As careful insurance, oral historians insisted on tape recorded or written summaries of interviews. Wherever possible, the transcript of such records should be checked by the interviewee and corrected or extended. Combat historians were instructed to hold interviews in surroundings as free as possible from distractions or interruptions. Above all, the interviewer should study, before any interview, the maximum information possible about the subject of the interview.

Clearly, in World War II, field interviews could not be taped and their record was, therefore, less than perfect. But that material, often gathered near the place and time of significant action, frequently gave a truer account than did an interview tape recorded several years later. Certainly many combat interviews of World War II, conducted in foxholes, cellars, damp shelters, perhaps interrupted by shelling or bombardments or with the officer being interviewed forced to break off the interview to receive a report, send out a patrol, or issue orders, were not made under ideal conditions.

A few days before the capture of St. Lo, the author recalls talking to a young major about plans being made to take that important road center. An angry general burst into the tent to find out why the attack was not progressing. Within a few minutes, the general reorganized the battalion command and handed it to the major with whom I was talking. The final assault on St. Lo proved successful. The young officer, widely regarded as the hero of the engagement, was killed a few days later. He did not live to complete the interview, and an imperfect transcript is all that ever can be collected at first hand about that phase of the St. Lo attack.

Interviews in this collection differ greatly. In a number of cases, a key participant was severely wounded and could not be interviewed until much later. In February, 1945, I received from Washington an inquiry about a lieutenant who had led one of the first units of the 1st Division up from the Normandy beaches to a position on the heights above. I finally located him in a rest area in Belgium. He had been wounded on those heights in Normandy, evacuated to England, healed, sent back to his unit (now in Germany), hit again and sent back to the hospital, and again returned to duty. In Belgium, he gave me an engrossing interview. Ten years later, I found him in western Kentucky near my own home and asked him to go over his account again for a newspaper feature story I planned to write. His memory was good, and the details of his story were much the same as in his first account, which had been several months after the event. But the first account had an intensity of vividly experienced action that did not show up in the calmer second relating of his D-Day experience.

All the combat historians who conducted interviews were in military service, familiar with the nature of the men's training and many of the weapons they used. Those historians in the earlier phases of the war had been in similar marshalling areas with the men going to fight, moved out in the same types of landing craft, and lived in the open Normandy hedgerows and fields. However, it is not accurate to say that most combat historians bore the same brunt of battle as the men in the assault units. An occasional officer got permission to ride in a tank during a fire fight. Most of the men travelling near the

front lines in the first weeks went along roads that received occasional fire. Three historians were killed at a command post, supposedly safe from direct enemy fire, by an unexpected air raid. Two combat historians lost limbs from mines encountered while visiting troops in forward areas. Historians at Corps Headquarters during the early Normandy period, the Ardennes campaign, and in pursuits through Germany were sometimes involved in a shift in position for fear of hostile envelopment or a sudden attack that might involve capture of a part of an exposed section. On at least two occasions that I recall, the historians were issued thermite grenades so that we could quickly burn plans and directives in our possession in case of an airborne drop or a sudden tank incursion in our vicinity.

Some of us had been invited to examine, in England before D-Day, some of the new devices to be used in the Normandy attack, such as the DD tank, the Dukw, and Bailey bridge equipment. We were carefully briefed on the nature of the devilish beach obstacles that could puncture the bottom of a landing craft or supported mines that could blow the craft to pieces on contact. An interviewer could recall seeing bodies in the wrecks of vehicles that he would later ask about.

Perhaps the unemotional way in which many of these interviews were recorded fails to catch the drama that a novelist or a playwright might believe should be conveyed, but the matter-of-fact recitals are nearer to what the average soldier being interviewed really said. Combat historians were taught to get the story as the participant recalled it and to leave embellishment to others. We were especially warned to be wary of tall tales, to seek internal evidence in stories that would point to the need for a careful check, to seek witnesses to a single account that seemed implausible.

We soon learned to be careful not to lead the interviewee in his recital. If we were trying to establish the precise time of an attack, we were warned never to tell a soldier when he was supposed to have attacked. He would likely say that he jumped off when he was supposed to. We found it better to ask how long did the attack follow artillery preparation. That kind of operation had to be carefully timed down to the second, and an estimate of the interval before an attack was likely to be more accurate than asking a precise time of attack from a man who probably wore no watch or who would usually reply truthfully, "I did not have time to look."

Historians have worked out tests that should be applied to oral or written testimony about events or personal actions. To avoid fancy terms, I like to speak of simple rules of thumb: (1) Was the witness in a position to speak authoritatively about what he is describing — was he actually a witness, a participant, or did he get his information from an actual participant; (2) is there any reason why the witness fails to tell the whole truth or withholds part of the truth to defend himself or a friend or damage someone he dislikes; (3) is there reason to suspect that the witness feels that any story of failure of lack of judgment will damage someone he respects or likes (some interviewees hesitate to tell an interviewer something that they feel he does not want to hear); and (4) does the interviewee follow a pattern of truth in his account. Many witnesses, if not checked, almost by nature improve a story either to make a dull experience more interesting, or because it reflects added glory on them, or because they think it is expected of them. If the interviewer fails to keep these points in mind, it is important that the historian who later uses these accounts remembers to apply the same rules to oral history that he would apply to any written or published document.

Shortly after World War II, I drew from a diary I had kept while conducting combat interviews in the years 1944-45 in Europe a rough draft of a book that I thought of calling "History While It's Hot". I never wrote the finished book, but used the title for a speech I gave in the 1950's at the first session held on oral history by one of the larger professional historical associations. I later published an outline of the speech in a state library journal, and repeated much of the same material in the 1960's in an address at the organizational meeting of the Oral History Association. In all these speeches, I stressed the following: combat interviews and oral interviews are subject to the same faults and tests for accuracy as any other source of history. They must be checked and viewed with a scholar's suspicion. That a tale is told and set down or published is no final proof that the teller of the tale has told the exact truth or saw what he purports to have seen. But when one reads a factual account of one who has fought in a battle, taken part in a great conference, or witnessed a great event he has felt the hot breath of history on his neck. I hope that many who use the accounts here published may share in that experience.

### **USER INSTRUCTIONS**

The instructions below describe the accession numbering system used for the collection, and review the scope, organization, information elements, and suggested uses of the Bibliography of Documents, Index of Names and Locales of Military Operations, Index by American Military Units, and Chronology.

### **File Organization and Accession Numbers**

Combat Interviews are organized by major military unit and in chronological order within each unit.

Each Combat Interview has been assigned a single accession number for reference purposes in the Bibliography and Index sections. This accession number is the same number assigned to the original Combat Interviews housed at the Washington National Records Center operated by the National Archives and Records Administration in Suitland MD. and is identical to the document's microfiche accession number within the companion microfiche collection.


### **Bibliography of Documents**

Combat Interviews are composed of a variety of documents other than the actual interviews, including narratives, periodic and operations reports, extracts from official journals and histories, field orders and letters of instruction, maps and map overlays, and photographs.

Documents included in Combat Interviews were organized into a logical sequence when they were originally compiled. However, since that time materials have been added to and removed from many of the folders. Additionally, much of the material has been disorganized through research use. The contents listings in the Bibliography reflect the organization of the documents on the microfilm and our best efforts to reorganize the materials into their original sequence.

### **Individual and Group Entries**

All items in the microfiche collection are described individually in the Bibliography of Documents. In addition, group en-



tries have been used to describe adjacent Combat Interviews that cover the same major military unit, at the same location(s), during the same period of time.

A group entry provides the description and bibliographic data common to the series of Combat Interviews, while successive entries for each of the individual Combat Interviews contain collations and contents listings specific to the individual Combat Interview.

### Bibliographic Data

Bibliographic data given for each main entry listing include the following items:

- Titles Titles appear in boldface type immediately following document accession numbers. In order to facilitate searching, titles for the same military operations and combat actions have been standardized.
- Date The date provided is the date of military action or period of coverage.
- Collation The collation refers to the total number of pages occupied on the microfiche by the document.

### **Contents Description and Listing**

Brief descriptions have been prepared for each item in the collection. Descriptions include information on the coverage and scope of the document, as well as a listing of the contents with page numbers.

### Index of Names and Locales of Military Operations

The Index of Names and Locales of Military Operations provides access by (1) names of towns, cities, and rivers at or near areas of military engagement; (2) names of specific operations and key defensive positions such as "Operation Cobra" and "Siegfried Line."

Entries in this index consist of the following structural elements:

- terms;
- title of the document;
- date of action or coverage;
- accession number assigned to each indexed document

and used to identify that document in the *Bibliography* of *Documents* and the microfiche collection;

• "see" and "see also" references.

### **Index by American Military Units**

This index includes all the names of uniquely numbered military units covered in Combat Interviews. Terms consist of the type of unit followed by its characterization. Subheads referring to the specific number of the unit are also included.

See and see also references are provided to lead the user from a subject type approach to the names of specific units. Thus, under "Engineer units" the user is led to "Battalions, Engineer Combat," "Companies, Engineer Light Pontoon," and all other engineer units included in the index.

Document titles under each military unit designation and number are listed alphabetically.

### Chronology

This section lists the title of each Combat Interview by the date of action or coverage, from the earliest to the most recent. Combat Interview titles under each date are listed alphabetically.

### Acknowledgements

We are deeply indebted to Dr. Forrest C. Pogue, who took time from his busy schedule to write "U.S. Army Historical Section Activities in the European Theatre." Dr. Pogue's account of the effort to record the momentous events described in the Combat interviews provides a fascinating backdrop to the overall collection.
