Mandatory E-Filing Court Rules

July, 2013 Rules of Court (see Cal. Rules of Ct., Rule 2.250 et seq.) now allow California counties to opt into the <u>mandatory</u> E-Filing and E-Service pilot project that has been in effect in Orange County since the start of 2013 (see amended Code Civ. Proc. § 1010.6, backed by the Judicial Council, Orange, LA, Riverside, and San Diego counties).

Counties, by local rule, may now choose which type of civil actions must be filed and served electronically; and per the JC's 6/28/13 news release: "[D]espite being given until July 2014 to adopt the rules, the council intended to accomplish this well before the statutory deadline so that more courts would be able to take advantage of this important technology."

Coverage of the new July rules was already included in the August update of <u>Matthew Bender® Practice Guide:</u> <u>California Pretrial Civil Procedure</u> (see Ch. 27, Service of Papers, § 27.35, plus two new JC forms in §§ 27.56, 27.57). This is a compelling example of the importance of the twice-a-year updating we offer for our entire California Matthew Bender® Practice Guide line.

Same-Sex Marriage Updates

In the December 2013 release of <u>California Forms of Pleading and</u> <u>Practice</u>, two recent U.S. Supreme Court cases on same-sex marriage, *Hollingsworth v. Perry* (2013) 2013 US Lexis 4919, and *United States v. Windsor* (2013) 2013 US Lexis 4921, have been incorporated in several chapters. As of June 28, 2013, following from these cases and resulting action by Governor Brown, same-sex marriage is legal throughout California.

Condominiums

In the March 2014 release of <u>California Forms of Pleading and</u> <u>Practice</u>, Ch. 124, *Condominiums and Other Common Interest Developments*, will be completely revised, following California's adoption of a new statutory scheme for this type of property development. <u>California Legal</u> <u>Forms</u> will include transactional coverage of the new scheme in its December 2013 release.

Quieting Title

In the upcoming December 2013 release of <u>California Forms of</u> <u>Pleading and Practice</u>, Ch. 482, *Quieting Title*, has been updated with reorganized and edited discussion, and updated forms, in this key area of real estate practice.
