Setting up an Alert on Lexis Advance

1. Run your search (e.g., profane trademarks)
2. From your search results click the **Alert “bell”** icon to set up your Alert:
 - **Overview tab:** title your Alert
 - **Monitor tab:** select the content your Alert will search
 - **Deliver tab:** choose the frequency, day and time for your Alert
3. Click **Create Alert** at the bottom of the screen
