

# Publication Ethics and Publication Malpractice Statement

All authors of original research involving Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples are expected to adhere to the [\*AIATSIS Code of Ethics for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Research\*](#).

### Publisher's confirmation
