

PAWS FOR THOUGHT:

Recent Changes to Companion Animals Law

The Family Law Amendment Act 2024 (Cth) commenced on 10 June 2025, unleashing new provisions acknowledging that companion animals are more than property—they are valued members of the family, and courts are empowered to make decisions that prioritise their welfare and emotional bonds, recognising their importance in family disputes and safety considerations.

Enactment & Definition

- » Enactment & Amendment: Family Law Amendment Act 2024 (Cth), commenced 10 June 2025
- » Definition of Companion Animal: Animal kept primarily for companionship (excluding assistance, business, agricultural animals)









Previous Legal Approach

- » Pets as property (chattel) before 2025
- » Case reference: Grunseth v Wighton (2022)

Court's Limited Orders

- » Court can transfer or sell the animal
- » No joint/shared ownership allowed









Factors in Judicial Decisions

- » Acquisition circumstances
- » Care contributions
- » Family violence & cruelty
- » Attachment & future care

Impact on Family Violence & Jurisdiction

- » Includes harm to animals in family violence laws (s 4AB)
- » WA's Family Court relies on the Family Court Act 1997 (WA) for de facto relationships.





The law now recognises companion animals beyond property—considering their welfare and emotional bonds.
