

NOTE ON SOURCES

The materials microfilmed for this publication are reproduced from Record Group 59 located at the National Archives in Washington, D.C.

EDITORIAL NOTE

The Department of State's files in Record Group 59 are composed of Central Files, records originating from various embassies and consulates, other agencies, and within the State Department itself; and "Special Files" or Lot Files, records maintained by various offices, bureaus, individuals, and committees in the department. The records microfilmed for this publication are reproduced from three Special Files.

University Publications of America made its selection of which files to microfilm after an extensive search of archival indexes for records relating to Korea and its special role on the cold war battleground.

These records were microfilmed in their original archival order as filed by the State Department. As a result, while most of the documents within each folder are filmed in reverse chronological order, some are filmed in chronological sequence.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

Maintained by various offices, bureaus, individuals, and committees in the Department of State, the Special Files contain a vast amount of information on a variety of foreign policy subjects. Originally, the Special Files were to contain only reference copies of correspondence, memoranda, minutes of meetings, reports, position papers, briefing materials, studies, and other nonrecord material maintained for convenience in office or individual files. Official copies of all permanently valuable State Department records were supposed to be included in the Central Files of the department. World War II and the subsequent cold war, however, put a heavy strain on the record-keeping system at the department. Also, officials became more reluctant to send particularly sensitive or important records to the more general Central Files. As a result, many original documents, record copies, working papers, drafts, informal notes, and annotated copies of memoranda were incorporated into the Special Files.

The Special File number comprises the last two digits of the year in which the file was retired or deactivated by the originating office or individual, a letter designation (D for department origination, F for origination at a Foreign Service post, and M for a special mission), and a final number that simply indicates the sequence in which a particular collection was retired. For example, Special File 55-D-128 refers to 1955 as the year in which the file was deactivated, D as originating at the Department of State, and it being the 128th file retired that year. It should be noted, however, that not all files that have been retired are still in existence. Some have been consolidated with similar material or have been destroyed because of a lack of permanently valuable records.

Lot File 55-D-128: Records of the Bureau of Far Eastern Affairs, Records relating to the Korean War, 1950-1952

These are records maintained by the Bureau of Far Eastern Affairs in connection with the outbreak of hostilities in Korea and the subsequent armistice negotiations. Included are a series of documents prepared by the Division of Historical Policy Research on the background of the conflict, the major events leading to U.S. intervention, and American policy with respect to the limitation of hostilities. There is also a copy of the "Korean Black Book on Cease-Fire," which documents the telegraphic exchanges between General Matthew Ridgway and the Joint Chiefs of Staff on the general armistice policy.

Lot Files 58-D-643 and 59-D-407: Records of the Office of Northeast Asian Affairs (Korea), 1952-1957

These are general subject files consisting of inter- and intradepartmental memoranda of conversations, position papers, minutes of meetings, operations memoranda, copies of U.S. Army telegrams, and "Official-Informal" correspondence between the Department of State and foreign service officials. The records cover all aspects of Korean internal and external affairs and Korean-American relations. They detail U.S. military, political, and economic aid to Korea; the U.S.-ROK economic talks held in Washington in 1955; the prisoner of war issue; problems with the 1953 armistice agreement; and U.S. congressional visits and cultural exchange programs.

These folders are arranged under the State Department Lot File names, which often represent divisions, bureaus, and offices dealing with various areas of the Far East. These Lot File names are in bold type and centered. Material in these folders includes memoranda, reports, and correspondence for record groups covering a span of years. The specific year(s) of the material is provided in the main entry for each folder whenever possible, along with the total number of pages of material. In the interest of accessing the material, this index denotes major issues, actions, and policy decisions relating to Korea under the heading Major Topics. The four-digit numbers on the far left represent the frame numbers at which the file folder begins. The researcher is referred to page ix for a list of acronyms and initialisms used in this guide.
